Oblates Leave Sefton after 70 years - A Tribute to Parishioners of Sefton

"He sent me to bring the Good News to the poor. ...And the Good News has been proclaimed to the poor". Over the past 70 years, the Missionary Oblates have brought their charism of evangelisation to their ministry at Sefton. Through their presence many have encountered the love of Jesus and accepted him as their Saviour. However, our mission is never ended. "We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces far beyond our capabilities." (Archbishop Oscar Romero).

"The purpose of a mission is to help others to discover themselves. It is especially to open ourselves to others as brothers and sisters, to discover them, and to encounter them." (Dom Helder Camera). Many relationships have been formed and God has been encountered in this community. We have so many good news stories to tell.

Proclaiming the Gospel has not been easy in these changing times. Evangelisation called for new initiatives and daring. Through the leadership of various Parish Priests, the parish was introduced to: liturgical changes, youth groups, prayer groups, Legion of Mary, Paulinians, Parish Missions and many more activities.

I have attempted to sketch a few impressions of my experience of Immaculate Heart of Mary Parish Sefton. These are memories that I will cherish for a life time. I will leave it to others to tell their story.

In 1948 an informal approach was made by Father Andrew McClusker OMI to the Archbishop of Sydney Cardinal Gilroy for permission to start a Mission House. The archbishop declined the offer. A pragmatic solution was reached by both parties, the acceptance of a parish which met the immediate needs of the diocese and moreover it was a parish that could serve to bring new missionary openings. Sefton was settled upon and the first Parish Priest, Father Breslin arrived in 1949.

In Sydney there was a huge post war development and growth in new suburbs and parishes. A priority for the church was the building of new schools and churches. Resources were scarce. When the Oblates arrived in Sefton they found many newly married people struggling to build their houses and raise a family. The only resources available to the Oblates were a block of land with a tiny hall and very small house. A huge and intimidating mission lay ahead including the building of a primary school, church and parish hall.

One of my earliest memories was of starting at the parish school in 1959. I had Sister Cleopas, a nononsense sister of St Joseph, along with 141 other students in her class. She attempted to teach us in primitive conditions. The Sisters of St Joseph at Sefton had few with professional training, they wore a full habit and veil and lived in sub-standard accommodation until the new convent was built and opened in 1963. Yet somehow, in the absence of resources, they managed to control the class and teach us which was quite an achievement. Today we recognise the great sacrifices made by those pioneering religious women. And we also acknowledge that our greatest and most important resource was the people of Sefton. The parish was poor and working class, but the spirit was great, and people were willing to work together.

One of the great parish celebrations at Sefton was the 15th of December 1981 when I was ordained an Oblate with Leo Mifsud and Paul Gwynne by Bishop David Cremin. It was one of the largest gatherings of Priests and people ever assembled at Sefton. The support and encouragement offered was huge and graciously received. From that day forward, Bishop Cremin in his own inimitable and friendly manner called us his sons. It felt good to be an Oblate and part of the Sefton Parish, a place that I will always call home.

Another son of Sefton, Mario Azrak was ordained an Oblate Priest at Sefton in 1999. He has spent the majority of his ministry in the Oblate Kenyan Mission. He has used his considerable gifts in the service of the Church.

Present day Sefton is an unassuming suburb in western Sydney and continues to surprise many with its strong catholicity. In the recent postal vote on same sex marriage, the electorate recorded the highest percentage no votes in Australia, helped no doubt by the expanding Muslim population. In what continues to be a very multicultural area the church is very much alive. A sign of this vibrancy has been the number of men and women who have answered the call to a vocation. The Oblate seminary of St Mary's has been blessed by those who have joined from Sefton over the years. At present Brother Thuan Duc Bui, whose parents live at Sefton, is in his third year of formation to become a missionary Oblate. Many other young people have joined religious life from the parish including Sister Niesha Allport RSJ, Sister Catherine Corbett (Mercy Sisters), Brother Geoffrey Barrington and Michael Flanagan (Marist Brothers), and in 2015 Sesilia Taufa'ao (Dominican Sisters) and Paul Bailey (Marist).

The Oblates who have served at Sefton have been a blessing for the parishioners. They have touched the lives of many parishioners through the sacraments, parish missions, pastoral visitation and care, and the many courses and programs they have offered. It is important to recognise that the blessings have flowed both ways. No Oblate priest has ever served at Sefton and not been amazed at the outstanding faith commitment of these parishioners. Sefton has more than its share of saintly people: there are many who have gone beyond the mundane to excel in holiness of life. Many of these holy people would not recognise their state of life: a large number of parishioners committed to attending daily Mass; many who give and sacrifice their lives for their children and family; others who care for the sick; and those committed to serving the poor.

So, it came as an unexpected announcement that the Oblates would be leaving Sefton. After 70 years, Sefton can boast a rich history which has indelibly touched the lives of many people. In these times of falling mass attendance and lack of commitment Sefton still stands out as a vibrant and faith filled community. My immediate response to this news was a sense of loss and sadness.


So, you could ask the question, "Why would the Oblates hold onto the Parish of Sefton"? While one could rationalise leaving or staying due to the shortage of priests, it is more important to have a faith response. All our ministries are loved and embraced and none will be let go easily. We have to take the larger view that we are being called for whatever reason to serve elsewhere.

In truth, Sefton has embraced the charism and spirit of St Eugene. It is an active and vibrant parish and the work of preaching the good news to the poor with their many faces needs to continue. While there is sadness, we also need to celebrate and rejoice in the life of this faith community. There have been few Oblate Parishes that can match the spirit of Sefton. The Oblates can be proud of a job well done. The parish acknowledged with gratitude the contributions made by so many Oblates at a farewell Mass and dinner on Easter Monday. It was a time of remembrance of the joyful years lived in faith.
